

Alfie is my hero: he bravely describes his journey from a typical player to a leader of men to an international champion. Then he reveals the secret that has gnawed at his insides for years and has led to the collapse of his marriageâ "he is gay. He reveals the years of inner torment he suffered knowing that he was leading a double life. The narrative is precise, without being maudlin. We follow Gareth through it all to his becoming an out and proud man, loved by family and team members. A story to remember and to inspire.

It has been said of rugby: "If there is no blood on the line, it is not rugby league." Gareth Thomas was 6'3" of fiercely competitive muscle and sinew, utterly confident in his ability to play the aggressive full-contact sport (played with little or no padding). As a captain, he led by example and backbreaking hard work. He was a national hero, becoming the first Welshman to win 100 caps in rugby union play. On the rugby pitch, he was the master of his destiny. But off the field, Gareth Thomas was almost brought to suicide by trying to keep his sexuality a secret. He feared rejection from everything he had known, but knew that unless he came out, he would eventually die. His autobiography is honest and raw in all aspects of his life and is particularly devastating regarding his love for his wife Jemma, their 3 heartbreaking miscarriages, and the eventual realization that although he loved her with 99% of his being, it was not enough for either of them. I listened to the audiobook, beautifully and soulfully narrated by the Welsh actor Matthew Gravelle.

Here is a story of a macho guy supressing his real identity in sports for so long, yet his close friends seemed to know it. It is inspirational for anyone who is gay but has not come out yet. Well written. Gareth had established himself as a blood and guts guy in rugby early on but there were still some slurs. Nfl football still isn't ready for this.
